

n July 29th the second edition of our book went to the publisher. This edition has everything the first one had and much more.


All of the stories submitted after the Gettysburg Reunion were added to this edition as well as such additions to the history that have been unearthed.

Constitutionally Speaking...



A Special Report by **Secretary Kovite**

Shipmates,

The Constitution is a remarkable document, the first in human history to place the power of government in the hands of the common people rather than a king. The Preamble is simple and straightforward, leaving no doubt as to what our forefathers intended:

"We the People of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defence, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America."

I will continue to highlight other Articles in the future that make this document a beacon to the world, and one that lives and breathes democracy. - Jeff

The Preamble to the Constitution

This simple paragraph can be likened to a "Users Manual" for our Federal Government, as the Framers of the Constitution described the structure and the rules under which it functions. Here are the highlights:

- 1. It was ratified on September 17, 1787 at the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia.
- 2. The Constitution is divided into seven articles, or parts, plus a list of amendments - 27 so far.
- 3. At the beginning is the "Preamble" which states the reason this historic document was developed in the first place -to replace the Articles of Confederation, our first constitution, under which the national government was weak and states operated like independent countries.
- 4. The delegates devised a plan for a stronger federal government with three branches-legislative, executive and judicial-along with a system of checks and balances to ensure no single branch would have too much power.
- 5. The Preamble also states that the goals of the Constitution are to maintain law and order, protect the country from foreign invaders, promote "the general welfare" and in general, provide the "Blessings of Liberty" to all citizens.


Shipmates,

What's Up With the Web?





Located somewhere in your house is a "router". Some vendors may call it a modem or some other name but this black box with flashing lights is your connection to the WiFi, cable or fiber-optic vendors' equipment. What you may not know it that this device is also protected with a password.

Unfortunately, most of us do not change this password. If you have never changed it, it might even be the word "password" - folks, this password should be changed because the router is the gateway into your home systems: phone, smartphone, TV, computer, iPad, and any other devices that are automated. The vendor provided a booklet when your system was set up; locate it or call the help desk and ask how you go about changing the password on your router. - Steve


