## President's Letter

Shipmates,

May has arrived at long last and hopefully it has finally brought an end to this brutal winter that the majority of the country endured. May also brings us Memorial Day. This day deserves special recognition by those of us that have served and the families of all those men and women that gave their lives in defense of this Nation.

In spite of the machinations of our elected leaders, I continue to believe that Memorial Day should still be observed on May 30<sup>th</sup>. After all, it wasn't until 1968 that Congress created four long weekends by making four Mondays a Federal Holiday. Those four holidays were George Washington's Birthday (formerly February 22<sup>nd</sup>, and now merely an excuse for mattress sales), Memorial Day, Columbus Day (formerly October 12th), and Veterans Day. I'm glad that in 1975 cooler heads prevailed and returned Veterans Day to November 11<sup>th</sup> from the fourth Monday in October, effective in 1978.

I would fervently support any senator or representative

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that picked up the banner carried by Senator Daniel Inouye from 1987 until his death in 2012. Senator Inouye, every year during that period, introduced a resolution that Memorial Day be returned to May 30th. I don't

### July 4<sup>th</sup>, 1863

The most critical day of the Civil War was July 4<sup>th</sup>, 1863. On that day, President Lincoln received word of the decisive, bloody and hard fought victory over General Robert E. Lee's Army of Northern Virginia at Gettysburg.

On that day, Lee asked for a cease fire from the three days of fighting to gather the wounded. He offered a prisoner exchange so he would not be burdened by the several thousand Union prisoners his men had taken.

Union General George Meade refused the offer. By this time in the war, Union commanders realized that exchanged prisoners would be put back into the ranks of the Confederates; denying them, along with the superior number of enlistees and draftees in the Union Army would lead to success in a war of attrition.

Lee then decided to withdraw back to Virginia. He ordered one unit to remain behind to build large fires along Seminary Ridge that night to lead the Union forces to believe the Confederates were still there. He started his men

With the long hard winter behind us, and spring in full bloom, we turn our anticipation to the welcome warmth of the days to come. We will soon celebrate Memorial Day - the holiday that has become the kickoff to the sunny days of summer, and punctuated by the celebration of July 4th.

While thinking of this column, it occurred to me that many of us might have forgotten how these holidays came to pass or the history of their origins.

Memorial Day (formerly known as Decoration Day), originated after the American Civil War to commemorate the fallen Union soldiers of the Civil War. By the 20th century, Memorial Day had been extended to honor all Americans who have died in all wars. Memorial Day is a day of remembering the men and women who died while serving in the United States Armed Forces.

Known as the Fourth of July and Independence Day, July 4th has been a federal holiday in the United States since 1941, but the tradition of this celebration goes back to the 18th century and the American Revolution (1775-83).

In June 1776, representatives of the 13 colonies weighed a resolution that would declare their independence from Great Britain. On July 2nd, the Continental Congress voted in favor of independence, and two days later its delegates adopted the Declaration of Independence, a historic document drafted by Thomas Jefferson.

From 1776 until the present day, July 4th has been celebrated as the birth of American independence, with typical festivities ranging from fireworks, parades and concerts to more casual family gatherings and barbecues.

The United States of America has been blessed with fortitude and the will to break the ties of tyranny. Based on the foundation that all men are created equal, we remain the land of opportunity for those seeking a better life.

It's easy to stay in a comfort zone - we served - we did our duty - generations before us did the same. Yet today, we are faced with what could be the greatest threat of all in this most dangerous world: Apathy. As you celebrate

Memorial Day - take a minute to remember service members deployed all over the world. And when you celebrate Independence Day, remember that freedom isn't free. Our troops have paid with their blood to keep us free. Thank them and their families.

## Meet Mark Hampton



## Ship's Log Entries...

### Historian's Report

*A majestic ship was she, that sailed the seven seas, we were her crew, we saw it through, and logged our history.*



The Naval History & Heritage Command recently placed on-line the monthly Operational Reports for the period of April of 1966 through November of 1971 for all naval forces operating in Vietnamese waters. The main reason that I became interested in these newly released archives was the fact that I knew that Fiske had been in those waters during that period. I wanted to see if Fiske had been – as they said in the (very) old Navy – “mentioned in dispatches”. I didn’t find as much info as I wanted. Primarily for two reasons:

1) The Navy, in its infinite wisdom

did not produce a report for the month of March 1966, and

2) I have not yet received a response from the Navy History & Heritage Command on my request of the annual Operations Reports that all Navy units are required to submit.

More and more I’m becoming frustrated by this lack of action on the Navy’s part.

All I have are anecdotal reports from Shipmates that were in – or near – the War Zone from March 12<sup>th</sup>, until June 20<sup>th</sup> 1966.

I know, for instance that on April 4, 1966 the Fiske was fired upon by North Vietnamese artillery. Fiske did not

return fire and no damage or injuries were reported. I have anecdotal reports that one crew member was injured by shrapnel but the incident was never officially reported and therefore, according to the Tom Clancy Rule, never happened. I have more to report on the ’66 cruise but it will have to wait for another newsletter.

By the by – the ‘Tom Clancy Rule’ says, “*If it isn’t written down, it never happened.*”

These are words to live by as we approach the end of our tours on Earth

## Government Matters...

The VA form is fairly simple and straightforward, only front and back, with instructions.

For any shipmates of retirement age, or older, who are currently receiving VA Service Connected Disability benefits, and are at 60% rating and less than 100%, you should apply for Individual Unemployability.

If you are unable to work and are younger than retirement age, you can still apply, though you will need a physician’s statement that you cannot perform gainful employment due to disability.

Those under retirement age should also file for Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) which you can also

receive. Current benefits at 100% include all medical treatment free, no co-pays; in addition, you can get free glasses, dental care, orthopedic shoes in some cases, and free pharmacy prescriptions.

Monthly benefit rates at 100% now are \$2858.24/month, \$3017.60 if your spouse is with you. Spouses are also entitled to some health care and educational benefits - Jeff D.


west over South Mountain into the Cumberland Valley, and then south toward the Potomac River, with Virginia on the south side.

But Gettysburg was only part of the news Lincoln received that day. At Vicksburg, Mississippi, General Ulysses Grant received the surrender of the garrison at Vicksburg, commanded by Confederate General John C. Pemberton.

These twin Union victories delivered a much needed boost to the morale of the people of the North.

Gettysburg was the first resounding defeat of Lee's army, and it was the last time General Lee would send anything more than a raiding party into Northern territory, while Grant's victory at Vicksburg left the Mississippi River completely in Union control.

July 4<sup>th</sup> was much celebrated in the Northern states in 1863. - Jeff D.


Among the "hot topics" brought forth were plans and actions involving the Veterans Benefits Administration, POW/MIA, the Veterans Health Administration, the National Cemetery Administration, as well as the Military Compensation and Retirement Modernization Commission, and the USO.

One particular item of note is that on April 1, the Legion's legislative staff worked with the staff of both the House and Senate Committees on

Veterans Affairs to examine the possibility of starting legislation to help transform the appeals process - in a similar manner to the Fully Developed Claims (FDC) process - that the American Legion took the lead in developing for the Veterans Administration.

Frank gets a big BZ for his continued good works - not just as our chaplain, but for all vets as well!

## Fiske Mates

Featuring John Naldrett 1964-1967  
& Jim "Stew Baby" Stewart 1964-1967

Note: These Fiske Tales, in their own words, recall how John got back on board as the Fiske as pulling out of port, and why Stew pulled extra duty for an NWA inspection.

Best friends and shipmates stick together, and so it has been with John Naldrett and "Stew Baby" Stewart.

From their adventures around the world on the Fiske to Stew's wedding - where John was his Best Man and Godfather to his son - the two were thick as thieves, and remain best friends today. This is John's Fiske Tale:

"Upon going through the Panama Canal, we were headed for Subic Bay, Philippines. We stayed there a day or two. From there, we went to Yokosuka, Japan. The ship's generator needed to be replaced or fixed.

Me and my buddy Jimmy Stewart went to Toyko for two days, had some fun and came back by train to the ports. Jimmy was ahead of me and went up the gang plank first. I was too late; they pulled the gang plank aboard the ship and were pulling away from the pier. There was one mooring line left; so I threw my bag up on the bow of the ship and grabbed the mooring line as the ship was backing out. I climbed the mooring line to the bow of the ship. *The Captain didn't look happy!*"



Some of Stew's recollections - "While in Vietnam, we were in combat zones three different times - 3/11/66, 4/4/66 and the 3rd - 5/25/66 - we were more than a days - like weeks. We had rescue missions, plane guard missions, and we were fired on by enemy shore batteries more than we wanted."

After the Fiske had returned home to Newport, Stew was transferred to the separation barracks for his final physical. He wrote... "While there, the ASW Officer, LTJG Lipscher, visited me; "Stewart he said, we've been hit with an NWA, nuclear weapons acceptance inspection - please come back on board and help us. I don't have anyone to operate the Asroc Station computer the way you can". So, I did. And oh yea .. the USS Fiske passed the NWA!"

than for an individual to try and keep up with the changes in the tax laws.

During the intervening years between reunions, the activities of the Association are generally light and amount to a maintenance of activities that are fairly routine in nature. The income stream is normally quite low and relies upon the receipt of dues from the members for its support. With nearly 600 members on the current roster, your \$10.00 per year dues would bring in a healthy sum if all participated. Unfortunately, that is not the case and we have not had an overwhelming response to the voluntary request for payment of dues. Since the dues payment receipt on the newsletter was sent out three months ago, less than 8% of the shipmates have responded. While this is not yet a critical situation for the Association, it does not keep pace with the minimum financial needs.

Also, while we do have sales from the Ship's Store, we see only minimal profits from those sales during this interim period between reunions.

This is your Association and only you can assure its continued existence. If you are unsure if you are current in your dues, a quick email or phone call to me will answer the question. A mail in dues form and all contact information are on page 8.




