

Constitutionally Speaking.... Article Two - The Executive Branch





Shipmates, a President must be a natural born citizen at least 35 years of age and a resident of the United States for at least fourteen years. The person elected to be President takes the following oath:

"I do solemnly swear that I will faithfully execute the Office of President of the United States, and will do to the best of my ability, to preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States".

The Vice President and every officer of the federal government, takes a similar oath.

The President is the chief executive of the United States. He and the Vice President serve a term of four years. The President can only serve two terms. (Amendment XXII, ratified in 1951). The President is elected by a majority of Electors, chosen by each state, equal to the number of Senators and Representatives from that state. In case of a tie, the House of Representatives shall vote by ballot to choose a President.

- The President is Commanderin-Chief of the armed forces and of the States's National Guard when it is called into the service of the federal government (but he cannot declare war - that is the responsibility of the Congress). The President can make treaties as long as two thirds of the Senate concurs.
- The President appoints Ambassadors, judges of the Supreme Court and all other officers of the United States. The President shall, from time to time, give to Congress information on the State of the Union (it does not specify how this is done) and shall recommend such measures as he deems necessary.

- The President shall see that the laws are faithfully executed.
- The President, Vice President and all civil officers of the United States shall be removed from office on impeachment for, and conviction of, treason, bribery, and other high crimes and misdemeanors. There is no definition of "high crimes and misdemeanors". The House of Representatives has the power of impeachment and the Senate conducts the trial.

Our Constitution is a model that brings hopes of democracy to other nations of the world. In future newsletters, I will continue to share insights of this amazing document with you. - Jeff *

More About Good Passwords....

Your Key to Security on the Web

Here is an example of a good password: p2?[6jg95mA" A password like this was created by a free program you can use to generate a password like this one. Use this resource to generate passwords and write them down. Then, every 2 or 3 months change them all, using the list you created.

Go to **www.strongpasswordgenerator.org** and write down the first password that appears.

Then click the Generate button to create another. Write down several. Perhaps 8 or more. You can then rotate them every several months.

Recent developments in the tech world have caused leaders to focus on a new way of creating and using passwords. Instead of creating complex passwords, as described above, you use a string of simple words that would only make sense to you. For example, My toy train is a Lion-el from Brooklyn.

This string of words has meaning to me but, hopefully, no one else. Under these new guidelines, this would be considered a "strong" password. Unfortunately, not all service providers are ready to accept such a password. They have "rules" about length, use of special characters and phrases. It will take time for the new guidelines to become more firm.

The Battle of Saratoga

SEPTEMBER 19, 1777, AND OCTOBER 7, 1777

The word Saratoga is shorthand for two battles that gave the coup de grace to the 1777 British invasion from Canada during the American Revolutionary War.

The Battles of Saratoga marked the climax of the Saratoga campaign, giving a decisive victory to the Americans over the British in the American Revolutionary War.

British General John Burgoyne led a large invasion army southward from Canada in the Champlain Valley, hoping to meet a similar British force marching northward from New York City and another British force marching eastward from Lake Ontario.

The southern and western forces never arrived, and Burgoyne was surrounded by American forces in upstate New York.

Burgoyne's strategy to divide New England from the southern colonies had started well but slowed due to logistical problems.

He won a small tactical victory over General Horatio Gates and the Continental Army in the *September 19 Battle of Freeman's Farm* at the cost of significant casualties. His gains were erased when he again attacked the Americans on October 7

in the *Battle of Bemis Heights*, and the Americans captured a portion of the British defenses.

Burgoyne found himself trapped by superior American forces with no relief in sight, so he retreated to Saratoga (now Schuylerville) and surrendered his entire army there on October 17.

The Battle of Saratoga was a great turning point of the war. Burgoyne's surrender was instrumental in formally bringing France into the war as an ally, and by bringing money, supplies, and soldiers to aid the Americans.

To celebrate the American victory at Saratoga, the Continental Congress issued a proclamation for a national day "for solemn Thanksgiving and praise," the first official holiday observance with that name.

Visitors may tour the battle sites of Saratoga, which are preserved by the Saratoga National Historical Park In 1966 the park was listed in the National Register of Historic Places.


